Questions Posed by A Mercy

One question is who is responsible?

Another is can you read?

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Reading vs. Seeing

- The question posed is not "Can you see?" but "Can you read?"
- Distinguishing "reading" from "seeing" foregrounds interpretation as a **learned** practice that depends on a reader's culturally-competent grasp of the socially-situated conventions and codes across a range of human and non-human interactions.

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
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Race in the Novel

 Race, as it emerges over the course of the novel, is not a **thing** that inheres in a person's body or blood. Rather, it is a way of **reading** human others for the purpose of deciding how to interact with them.



- A MODE OF BEING devoted to dismantling colonialism's pernicious legacies related to the systemic objectification of "types" of human beings
- EXPOSE "Modernity/Coloniality" as a false way of thinking that bolsters claims for European centrality and superiority
- GOAL is overturning the matrix of being, power, and knowledge that has been constitutive of the white supremacist logic of Western modernity's project of civilization.



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What makes a project decolonial?


- · Imperative to act
- · Focus elsewhere to perceive anew
- Critique autonomous individualism, binary thinking, Eurocentrism
- Champion relationality, witnessing, self-assessment
- Recognize onto-epistem-ological multiplicity
- · Develop complex solidarities
- · Regard the cultural practices of formerly colonized people as resources
- · Reject the subordination or exploitation of others
- · Remake themselves and the world(s) they inhabit
- · Create a new world "in which many worlds fit"

Narrative Structure

Distribute narrative attention and

character-space more or less equally across a large number of characters Eschew a singular protagonist; have Refuse the idea of minor-ness more major characters (among which are character-types usually consigned to the role of the minor character)

Democratize the space of the novel

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Content

Retell historical narratives with an attention to "histories from below" Rectify inaccurate representations of people and groups who have been consigned to the margins or assigned the role of villain

Present a wide range of characters from Establish the presence and ethnoracial communities historically absent from or underrepresented in literature

heterogeneity of people belonging to marginalized ethnoracial groups

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Visions

Include scenes and interactions between characters that tell about, or show instances of, violence and exclusion based on historicallydenigrated human characteristics

Demonstrate the processual and evolving nature of the dynamics of subordination that occur along the lines of race, gender, sexuality, ability, etc.

Include a focus on how historical traumas are expressed at the level of the necessary prelude to finding a way individual and a concomitant focus on rituals of healing

Rework the pains of the past as a forward

Networks

Include a focus on interiority that is dispersed across a large number of major characters

Make visible the large number of "worlds of sense" that make up any one social world

Pay sustained attention over the course Dismantle the idea of the autonomous of the novel to how characters are connected in an evolving network of interactions

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Paratexts

Make extensive use of paratexts (epigraphs, sections, titles, prologues, epilogues) to call attention to the making of the narrative

Teach readers how to be self-aware perceivers of literary texts and their own social worlds

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
